Simon has pursued getting legs through other charities in the past, but due to issues with wound healing wasn't considered a candidate. Despite numerous setbacks, Simon contacted PPIHN through Facebook to inquire about being fitted! Simon did wonderfully walking with a left above knee prosthesis and right below knee prosthesis. In 2012, on PPIHN's very first trip to Zambia, John's first patient was a Catholic Nun from Lusaka. She is now living in Choma and got put back in contact with PPIHN through the disabilities office we work with there. John was able to see her for the first time since 2012.
